






LWML National Convention News

Homeless shelter: Lighter bath towels; Personal items for everyone; winter coats and gloves (needed later in the fall).

<u>Bethesda Food Pantry:</u> Groceries! (If you have something you can't use, bring it to share). Checks are always welcome, just put in the box with the cross on it - we check it weekly. Monetary donations allow the food pantry to buy what they need at a greatly reduced cost.

<u>Orphan Grain Train:</u> Christian reading material. Sunday school material, Bibles, hymnals, devotional books, Bible studies, etc.

<u>Story County or future mission trips:</u> School supplies are always in big demand especially back packs.

<u>Lion's Club</u>: Eyeglasses. (Box is located on top of the coatrack).

<u>Riverside Manor:</u> Small trinkets/items for Bingo prizes. (Box located on shelf of WEST coatrack).

<u>Old Cell Phones and Ink Cartridges for LWML</u>: Bring us your old cell phones (with charger) and home and/or office ink cartridges and place them in the container in the fellowship hall.

Thank you for all you bring to the collection corner, it is all used and appreciated.



November 2014






