There are many other ways too. Pray to the Lord to lead and guide you.

Every year we sing the song "Go Tell It on the Mountain." This year, may the Lord move us from singing to bringing, so that through the Holy Spirit's power we may bring the good news of Jesus' coming to all those around us who are in need of hearing it.

Worship Time on December 28 and January 4



Human Care News

Good Neighbor Emergency Assistance Monthly Report

For the first three months of Fiscal Year 14-15, Good Neighbor has provided rent and/or utility assistance to 113 households. In the same three months, the agency has provided 1,360

Healthy Food vouchers to 340 households and distributed 66 gas vouchers. This is 100 more Healthy Food vouchers than what was distributed in June/July/August of 2013. The increase of assistance is thought to be because of the new location, which is more centralized to downtown Ames, and there is easier access to individuals needing assistance that must use Cyride for transportation.



Snack for hungry kids



Please bring take home snacks for the school children for Christmas break. Let's fill the food pantry bin with granola bars, fruit snacks, pudding cups and anything else that can go into a back pack for children to take home. Many of these kids depend on school meals for their daily food. These will be taken to the school before winter break begins for distribution.



It is time to begin collecting <u>clean</u>, gently used winter coats, and new hats and gloves. Items will go to HOPE Ministries or the Bethesda clothing bank.

Need Help?



Stewardship News

A Spirituality of Stewardship

Tithing is a spiritual action. In a materialistic age, it reminds us that Jesus is Lord of our lives. But it also is a spiritual offering to God. There is a reason that the offering is carried up to the altar as part of the church service. Spiritually we should offer ourselves up—our time, talent and treasure—during the offertory as well.

When stewardship is discussed in church, the three T's mentioned are Time, Talent, and Treasure. But often people hear just another talk about money. Stewardship is the offering of our entire selves to God. We have a choice: to live self-willed lives or Christ-centered lives. God gives us all our time, talents and treasure; we should give back to him the first fruits of these gifts.

God's grace in its various forms" (I Peter 4:10).

What would it look like to give God 10% of our time? In a 24-hour day, that adds up to almost two and a half hours of time



given directly to God. The time could be spent for mental prayer, spiritual reading, helping those in need, or volunteering for church responsibilities/activities. God does not just want our money – he wants our hearts. He wants us to show Him that we are in love with Him, and that He is in first place. Tithing of our treasure, apart from giving God our talent, and perhaps more valuable, our time, is empty, like the husband/father who gives his family lavish gifts but never spends time with them.

What amount of the day do you currently give to God in prayer? How do you show Him that you love Him above all things? What are some ways in which you might be able to share more of your gifts (talents) with the Church?

To find the answers to these questions, please ask God in prayer for His guidance!
