#### **Call Update from Pastor**

In the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, a vacant congregation (one without a pastor) will seek God's guidance regarding who might be the Lord's choice for the next pastor for that ministry. Following self-study, prayer and a congregational meeting, a vacant congregation will issue a "call" to the pastor the church believes God desires to serve there. A pastor in our Synod can receive an official "call" like this to another congregation at any time. Unlike the way in which a job generally works, where you usually apply for the position, the pastor does not apply for the pastorate. The Lord, through the congregation, seeks the pastor.

Most of you know that in late January I received an official call to serve as pastor at Canoga Park Lutheran Church in Canoga Park, California. Over the next number of weeks I sought God's guidance and engaged in prayer regarding where He would have me serve Him in ministry. Likewise, the members of our church and of Canoga Park Lutheran Church prayed for me. Ultimately, we all prayed that God's will would be done.

Sunday, February 15, I announced at both worship services that God led me to decline the call to Canoga Park Lutheran Church. God reaffirmed for me the call I have at St. Paul. Through this process I sensed that Jesus has more for me yet to do at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Ames. Jesus has more for all of us to do! Will you be a part of His mission and work together as we serve our Savior?

We are embarking on the implementation of a 10-year vision for our congregation. This vision includes such ideas as expanding our preschool, engaging in more Gospel outreach in the community, enhancing our ministry to families with children and youth, and much more. It is important that we all use our gifts to serve Christ in our church, which is ultimately His church. I pray you will be as involved as you possibly can! May God continue to bless us as together we proclaim the good news of Jesus.



**Girls' Volleyball Camp – June 7-13.** For Girls who completed 4th-8th grade. Cost: \$325. At Volleyball Camp you will be coached by trained professionals based out of Wichita KS who will bring campers to a new skill level.

**Girls Basketball Camp - June 7-13.** For girls who have completed 4th-12th grade. Cost:\$325. At Okoboji Girls' Basketball Camp, professional coaches teach basketball handling and drills to meet the skill levels of the different age groups.

**Jr High Week - July 5 – 11.** For youth completing 6th-8th grades. Cost: \$310. Meet new friends as you engage in Bible study, crafts, music, and recreation with the return of archery, 9 square and gaga ball. Junior High Week is led by Professional Church Workers who have a love for 6th-8th grade ministry.

**Concordia Cub Week - July 12 -18.** Week-long camp designed for children who have completed 3rd-6th grades. Cost: \$330. Campers enjoy, games, crafts, Bible studies and night devotions by the lake. Events returning will include archery, canoeing, gaga pit, ultimate Frisbee, 4-way soccer, and cabin challenges.

**Youth Week - July 19 -25.** Youth Week is a Christ-centered week for 8th-12th graders who engage in sports, music, a topic relating to present day life situations, and faith building events which develop character and positive relationships and more! Cost: \$320.

# **Human Care News**

#### March Good Neighbor News

The last Good Neighbor committee meeting was held on January 20 at Good Neighbor of Story County. For the first six months of the current fiscal year, Good Neighbor has provided a total of 202 households with rent and/or utility assistance, 2,440 Healthy Food vouchers to 610 households and 114 gas vouchers. Director Mike Fritz submitted a request for a 2.5% increase from United Way of Story County and the City of Ames in order to support additions to the Healthy Food Voucher and Rent/Utility Assistance programs but has not heard back from them yet.

The annual fundraiser, "Irish Fest," will be held on March 28 at Dublin Bay. The afternoon will include a silent auction and the music of "Holy Ground" from Minneapolis. The month of April is "Good Neighbor Month." During the month several write ups will be printed in weekly bulletins. The tentative meeting of Good Neighbor will be on February 17 at First Christian Church.

# Stewardship News

People often ask or wonder "what are the biblical principles for Christian giving?" As we seek God's answer to that question and we prayerfully consider our own giving to the Lord's church in response to the clear teaching of His Word, perhaps it would be wise and helpful to review a couple key Bible passages. It is in God's word where we can find the answers to how He wants us to use our Time, Talents, and Treasures.

Let's consider 2 Corinthians 9: 6-8: Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that in all things at all times; having all that you need, you will abound in every good work.

In Romans 12: 4-8: Just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we who are many form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. We have different gifts, according to the grace given us. If a man's gift is prophesying, let him use it in proportion to his faith. If it is serving, let him serve; if it is teaching, let him teach; if it is encouraging, let him encourage; if it is contributing to the needs of others, let him give generously; if it is leadership, let him govern diligently; if it is showing mercy, let him do it cheerfully.






**Treasures** 

When stewardship is discussed in church, the three T's mentioned are Time, Talent, and Treasures. Stewardship is the offering of our entire selves to God. We have a choice: to live self-willed lives or Christ-centered lives. God gives us all our time, talents and treasures; we should give back to him the first fruits of these gifts.

What would it look like to give God 10% of our time? In a 24-hour day, that adds up to almost two and a half hours of time given directly to God. The time could be spent for mental prayer, spiritual reading, music, helping those in need, or volunteering for church responsibilities/ activities. God does not just want our money – he wants our hearts. He wants us to show Him that we are in love with Him, and that He is in first place. Tithing of our treasures, apart from giving God our talent, and perhaps more valuable, our time, is empty, like the husband/father who gives his family lavish gifts but never spends time with them. What amount of the day do you currently give to God? How do you show Him that you love Him above all things? What are some ways in which you might be able to share more of your gifts (talents) with the Church?

You have received a church mailing with the materials for Time & Talent Sunday on March 1<sup>st</sup> and Loyalty Sunday on March 8<sup>th</sup>. Please ask God in prayer, as individuals and as a family, for his guidance in making your choices and financial pledge in thanks and praise to Him.

#### **FAMILY SERVICE CIRCLE:**


