"Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have" (1 Peter 3:15). 



## **Human Care News**

#### April is Good Neighbor Awareness Month: "Who has Good Neighbor helped?"

The headlines in the news tell the numbers about poverty, but those numbers represent real people. Even when the economy is deemed stable, a family of three in Story County requires an income of more than \$15 per hour to meet its basic needs for food, housing and utilities. For these families, an unexpected medical bill or car repair can force them to choose between paying for food or rent. During these difficult economic times, many people have lost jobs, or experienced pay cuts and furloughs.



The number of families needing assistance, especially for the first time, continues to rise. In the past fiscal year, Good Neighbor provided rental and/or utility assistance to 345 households, representing 928 individuals that received help to remain in their homes with needed utility services. Over 73% of these individuals and families had incomes that were at or below 100% of the poverty level. These households were located in every community throughout Story County, with over one third residing outside of Ames.

In an effort to determine the long term impact of the services being provided, Good Neighbor conducts follow up surveys with landlords, property managers and utility providers. Surveys are conducted a minimum of nine months after rent/utility assistance has been provided by Good Neighbor. For the first nine months of the last fiscal year, the survey results are:

76% of those receiving rental assistance were either still in their homes or had moved in good standing with the landlord.

87% of those receiving utility assistance still had active accounts or had closed the account without leaving an outstanding balance.


"I'm so proud to be" a part of the St. Paul family. Thanks to everyone who attend-
