SAVE THE DATE: July 19-22 for VBS





Report from Good Neighbor Emergency Assistance

On May 19, GNEA board met at the Good Neighbor office at 613 Clark Ave.

Through the month of April, Good Neighbor has provided rent and/or utilities assistance to 293 households (25 in April) and 4,136 Healthy Food vouchers (600 in April) to 1,034 households (150 in April). The agency has also distributed 172 gas vouchers (19 in April) in the same period of time. GNEA continues to see a lower demand of services in comparison to the same time period last year. Good Neighbor was selected as a recipient of the Northcrest Community Outreach funding and will receive the contribution later in May.

Construction of the wheelchair ramp is essentially completed and GNEA and the contractor hope to get approval from the City of Ames. There are several interior repairs that will need to be done after discovering that the bathroom upstairs has been leaking and caused some ceiling damage. But repairs will be minor.

A tentative date for the Italian Dinner has been set for Sunday August 23 at 6:00. The meal will be held at Universalist Fellowship church located at 1015 Hyland Ave. Tickets should be available from church representatives by August. The Choir Concert fundraiser will be November 8 at 2:00 and will be held at Collegiate Presbyterian Church.

The next board meeting will be held on June 23 at noon at the Good Neighbor Office at 613 Clark Ave.



For the summer the women's Bible study group will meet on the 2nd and 4th


Mondays at 5:45 pm in the Youth room. We will not be doing a continuous series, but stand alone topics, so come when you are able.
