Letter from Pastor

November is Diabetes Awareness Month!

From Thomas Wilson

Many know my history with diabetes, but most might not know that I have struggled with this disease for over 30 years. I have gone from being diagnosed and doing well, to very high AIC (not GOOD!) to getting it back under control. It's hard. It's hard to control what you eat, what you



want to eat. Was this something that just showed up one day and I had no idea what to do? Did my parents not know about this? Well, I come from a long line of diabetics. My sister Karen and I were both diagnosed as juvenile diabetics. My mother, father and brother were diagnosed in adulthood. I knew the seriousness of this disease, my sister had kidney failure and lost her eyesight, she eventually passed away from complications to the disease. My brother has battled over the years with his, not taking care of his feet he has had both legs amputated, kidney failure and kidney transplant. Diabetes is my life!

The American Diabetes Association (ADA) has been very active in shining a light on the awareness of Diabetes. There are approximately 34 million children and adults who have been diagnosed with diabetes in the United States. This makes diabetes an epidemic. The cost of diabetes in the United States has reached over \$327 Billion. People with diabetes have a 2.3X greater health care cost. Monthly cost for medications exceeds \$2,000 for each person.

Complications from diabetes can include heart disease, stroke, amputation, end-stage kidney disease, blindness and death. With all of these complications it is heart breaking to know that roughly 88 million Americans, roughly 800,000 lowans, are living with prediabetes and not diagnosed. This disease is serious, and there are small steps that can be taken to help prevent these complications from happening.

By losing just 10 – 15 pounds you can drastically reduce the likeliness of Type 2 diabetes and complications. Being active and watching what you eat can make an impact on your prevention of diabetes as well as cholesterol, high blood pressure, and high blood sugars. The best thing for you to do is ask your doctor for a Diabetes screening, have them check and monitor your blood sugar. Catching it early can help dramatically when you are able to make corrections in your decisions.

I am now on an insulin regimen that has been outstanding. I have been able to see many great results in my health since I have started this insulin therapy. I make great progress each day to continue to monitor and acknowledge what I have and know that I am lucky to figure out that this disease is nothing to play around with. It's serious. And this month is a great reminder to take a look at this disease as not just another illness.

Homegrown Fruits of the Spirit: Living with a Present Mind

Many days we are tempted to think about work, our to-do list, or even finances when we are with our spouses or children. But the moments that truly matter are those when our loved one's heart and mind are overwhelmed and they become anxious. How can you be more emotionally present for those you love when they are in this place while you are not present in your own mind?

Here's a tip that might help. If thoughts of the day tend to distract you when you are at home, find a healthy way to decompress before you enter your loved one's "presence" (when they need you mentally and emotionally there). Work out, go for a walk, do something active. It may take more time, but it will set you up for success to be more fully engaged with those you love and are cultivating.

We read in Ephesians 6:4 "Fathers, don't stir up anger in your children, but bring them up in the training and instruction of the Lord." The Greek word for "training" and "instruction" literally means, "'a putting in mind,' then warning, admonition, instruction" so as to think about the right way of God. When our loved ones are overwhelmed, or not at peace, we can be a finite peace that literally calms them. We have the power to either provoke and disturb, or promote peace, and unite their heart and mind. Your whole presence is crucial in these overwhelming moments.

Another way to cultivate a present mind is to practice speaking peace in your home. In Genesis 3:20 we read, "The man named his wife Eve because she was the mother of all the living." The power of words starts in the beginning. Adam had the power to name his wife even after the fall. Instead of naming her "nag" or "exhausting" or even "worrywart," he named her "life." Eve. What are you speaking in your house? Are you using words that bring peace and calm, or words that provoke negativity?

As families, we go through a lot of suffering. Sometimes it's with our spouse. Quite often it's because of outside pressures like finances, work, or in-laws. But remember, you are a team. You are for one another, not against one another. We often need to remind ourselves of that.

APPLICATION:

How have you helped unite your loved one's inner turmoil and bring peace to their heart and mind in anxious situations?

How can you use your tongue to better cultivate peace and practice being truly present in your home?

Moring Prayer: Lord, teach me not to worry about tomorrow, but to rely on You for what we need today.

Bedtime Question: When you are scared, what are ways you can calm yourself down?





Women's Ministry

LWML National 2019–2021 Mission Grant #15 — \$62,650 Pre- and Post-Seminary Training for Local Church Workers

In villages across Ghana, Kenva, Malawi, Rwanda, Tanzania, Uganda, and Zambia, most local congregations are led by helpers, evangelists or seminary trained, and ordained pastors. Both the pre-seminary and post-seminary men are eager for opportunities to study theology in a community which will enable them to better serve their congregations. To enable those whom the church has called into service as lay leaders of these congregations, The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod Africa Mission Training Center provides continuing education opportunities for local pastors and their wives. The course may be taught by a church leader, a local seminary professor, or a missionary engaged in the work God has given him. This grant will provide basic theological training for lay leaders of congregations who serve under a pastor responsible for between five and 15 congregations. The training material allows the local pastor to work through a total of 22 workbooks (over two years) with his lay leaders. Lay leaders gather with their pastor for 5 days once a month. The program provides limited financial assistance to offset the costs of food and transportation.



In many remote villages across East Africa young congregations often gather together under trees for worship or under make shift structures of sticks and a tarp. Most often the worship services are led by evangelists.
