Letter from Pastor

Friends in the Lord,

Is it okay to grieve? What do you believe about this? And more importantly, what do the Scriptures say about this? "For everything there is a season, a time for every activity under heaven. A time to be born and a time to die...A time to cry and a time to laugh. A time to grieve and a time to dance" (Ecclesiastes 3:1-4). It sounds to me like the Scriptures say quite clearly that there is, indeed, a time to grieve.

We continue to grieve our son Donovan leaving us to be with Jesus. Though we are glad Donovan is in heaven, we are sad he is no longer here with us. And as my family grieves, our church family grieves as well. Donovan grew up in our house in north Ames, but he also grew up in the Lord's house at St. Paul. He attended Sunday School, midweek, and youth group right here among us, where he was taught about Jesus by many of our members. He worshiped with all of you on Sunday mornings. Donovan was confirmed in our congregation and supported by our members who mentored him in his walk with Christ. Donovan played praises to our Lord with the praise team and was blessed by the Christian witness and love of others with musical talents. As one of our members reminded me. not only does the Jenks family grieve, all of you here at St. Paul are also grieving Donovan's sudden accidental death as he left us so unexpectedly at a young age to join the heavenly praise team around the altar of our great God.

Yet as we grieve together, the Scriptures are quite clear that the Lord is here with us as we grieve! "For men are not cast off by the Lord forever. Though He brings grief, He will show compassion, so great is His unfailing love. For He does not willingly bring affliction or grief to the children of men" (Lamentations 3:31-33). Jesus is with us as we go through our grief, for Jesus Himself knows about grief very personally. Do you remember the favorite verse of many confirm-

ands? "Jesus wept" (John 11:35). Jesus cried bitterly when His dear friend Lazarus was dead, and those who saw Jesus said, "See how much He loved him" (John 11:36). We also cry when we lose someone we love, because we loved them so deeply.

Jesus knew that His closest friends, the disciples who followed Him, would grieve when He left them. So Jesus said to them: "Now is your time of grief, but I will see you again and you will rejoice, and no one will take away your joy" (John 16:22). Jesus' disciples were given the promise that they would see Him again. So too me and you have the promise, guaranteed by Jesus' victory over sin and death through His death and resurrection from death, that we will again see Donovan and all our other loved ones who have gone before us to be with Jesus.

Jesus Christ came to turn death into life for us, by giving His life for us, dying on the cross to pay for our sins, and rising from death back to life, so that we too might rise from death to life through Jesus Christ! Christ came to bring hope to our hearts when we grieve, as Paul proclaims: "We do not want you to be uninformed about those who sleep in death, so that you do not grieve like the rest of men, who have no hope. For we believe that Jesus died and rose again, and so we believe that God will bring with Jesus those who have fallen asleep in him" (1 Thessalonians 4:13-14).

I pray that God will be with all of us as we grieve the departure of loved ones who have left us to be with Jesus, and as we also at the same time believe in the victory won by Jesus and rejoice that our loved ones are with Christ in paradise – and that we will see our loved ones again, when we too are called to join God's praise team in our eternal home in heaven.



As we faced day after day of bitterly cold weather in early February, I decided it was time to think of warmer days ahead and all the beauty that comes with them. MARCH - NATIONAL KIDNEY MONTH

It's a little-known fact that March is National Kidney Month! We all have

some idea how important our kidneys are to our overall health. However, can you name even one function that our kidneys perform? I didn't think so! So here are six key things that our kidneys do for us: 1) Regulate the bodies' fluid levels. 2) Filters waste and toxins from the blood. 3) Release a hormone that regulates blood pressure. 4) Activates vitamin D to maintain healthy bones. 5) Release a hormone that directs production of red blood cells. 6) Keeps blood minerals in balance (sodium, phosphorus, potassium.) So if our kidneys do all these cool things for us, what can we do to ensure that our kidneys stay healthy? The following list contains some helpful ideas for maintaining our kidney health: 1) Exercise regularly 2) Control weight 3) Follow a balanced diet 4) Quit (or don't start) smoking 5) Drink alcohol only in moderation 6) Stay hydrated (6-8 cups of WATER daily) 7) Get an annual physical 8) Be aware of family history of kidney disease 9) Ibuprofen and naproxen should not be taken regularly Since a balanced diet is important, these foods are key for keeping our kidneys in tip-top shape: cabbage, cauliflower, garlic, onions, apples, cranberries, blueberries, raspberries, red grapes, egg whites, fish (especially salmon), virgin/extra virgin olive oil. Be aware that kidney disease may have little or no symptoms, so early detection is important. The best ways to detect kidney problems are to regularly have your blood pressure checked, have a urine test to detect protein in the urine, and have a GFR (Glomerular Filtration Rate) blood test and a BUN/creatinine blood test. It is vital to our overall health that we do all we can do help our kidneys function at their best. So take the above hints to

A prayer vigil is the practice of continual prayer carried out by a group. Prayer vigils have an ancient history carried on through the ages and then passed on in the monasteries. The first known Protestant continuous prayer was the "Hourly Intercession" of the Moravian Brethren in Saxony. Beginning in 1727 the prayers continued 24 hours a day uninterrupted for over 100 years!!!!

Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. Colossians 4:2 NIV

The prayer vigil will be on **Saturday April 3 from 6 a.m. to 4 p.m**. We won't be asking for an hour of prayer for the next hundred years but only 15 minutes. 


Pre-Stuffed Easter Egg Sale!

Homegrown Fruits of the Spirit: Living with Eternity in Mind



Living in the here-and-now can be very difficult. Too often we find ourselves wishing we were further along with our careers, personal finances, relationships, or even our relationship with God.

Much of our discontentment comes from the fact that God placed eternity in our hearts. In Ecclesiastes 3:11 we read, "He has also set eternity in the human heart; yet no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end." Yet we live in the confines of time and space. And since we have a hard time making sense of eternity in our mundane, daily routines, pains, heartaches, and everyday inconveniences, we turn to other things to find significance and give us an identity.

For some, our identities become our future dreams. Not settled in the now, we daydream about and strive for the not yet. In the meantime, we miss what God has for us today – and today is all we're promised.

There may be a struggle of making sure your kids do not disrespect or disobey you. You want them to listen. But when you live discontented lives, your fuses become quite short in the day-to-day. Instead of having patience to recognize that your kids – just like you- are still learning and developing, you act as if they too are the reason for your discontentment. Then, even the simplest provocation leads to yelling or words you later regret.

As you help your kids learn patience, focus on the eternity placed in your heart. Be content that you don't have to do anything to earn your heavenly Father's love. When you lead your family with eternity in mind, the day-to-day becomes much more about who you are in Him, and less about who you are not to the world. That's a perspective your kids long for.

APPLICATION: What do you most struggle with as it relates to living for eternity? Take time and write down three specific ways you can begin cultivating patience in your home and with your kids (e.g. more board games instead of screen time, not waiting until the last minute and rushing everyone out the door, etc.).

Moring Prayer: Lord Jesus, teach my children that "patience is better than power" (Proverbs 16:32).

Read the following scripture and take time to think about the answers to the following questions.

Colossians 3:1-4

What's this passage telling you to focus your mind on?

What is it telling you not to focus your mind on?

When you look at the conversations in your home, do your ongoing conversations reflect a Colossians 3:1-2 mind-set?

How do you see the conversations in your home needing to change to have your kids grow with an eternal mind-set?

How does an eternal mind-set compete with the instant gratification and comparison culture we find ourselves in today?

LWML National 2019–2021 Mission Grant #19 — \$100,000 Making Jesus Known in the United States Ethnic Communities

Throughout the country, there are many devoted first-generation immigrants serving in full-time ministry, reaching out to their ethnic communities and sharing the Gospel. Many of these church workers are enrolled in either of two Concordia Seminary programs – the Center for Hispanic Studies (CHS) and the Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology (EIIT). Both share the mission to make Christ known in their respective ethnic communities. CHS has a four-year program taught in Spanish and includes students from many Hispanic -Latino cultures. The EIIT program already has students that

have been working in Word and Sacrament ministry as part of their culture. These students often have strained financial circumstances that are making it difficult to pay for this necessary education. Most hold two and three jobs to make ends meet but are willing to go to great lengths in the service of Christ and His Gospel. It is vital that they have the Biblical foundation to go with their passion for ministry. This grant will go towards funding the education costs of these devoted students and church workers



Bennego Kangar is an Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology (EIIT) student and a native of Liberia. He serves at LINC (Lutheran Intercity Network Coalition) Ministries International -Twin Cities, in St. Paul, Minn. and at the Alley Church in Cottage Grove, Minn. He came to the U.S. from Liberia in 1992, first serving in Florida and later in Alabama, Texas and New Mexico before moving to Minnesota. Also during that 26-year period, he was called to service positions in Malawi and Brazil. His service with LINC includes church planting and outreach, mostly to members of large Liberian and Ethiopian communities in the St. Paul area. "My EIIT studies and my later ordination as a pastor will help enable me to share the Word from a stronger biblical foundation," he says. "I feel that God has called me to this service, and it's a passion of mine to bring people to Christ, to help them grow in their understanding of the Lord, and to help them to walk with Jesus Christ."



"Book to Know to Help You Grow"

Barnes and Noble synopsis of "Saving Amelie": Increasingly wary of her father's genetic research, Rachel Kramer has determined that this trip with him to Germany—in the summer of 1939—will be her last. But a cryptic letter

from her estranged friend, begging Rachel for help, changes everything. Married to SS officer Gerhardt Schlick, Kristine sees the dark tides turning and fears her husband views their daughter, Amelie, deaf since birth, as a blight on his Aryan bloodline.
