

"Get started on the right foot...."

Unless you have problems, likely the most ignored places in your body are your feet! Yet they support you all day long and need your attention. The American Podiatric Medical Association has chosen April to be National Foot Health Awareness Month, which is appropriate as we go for more walks as the weather improves. More than 20% of Americans have problems with at least one foot every year. Their goal is to decrease that number with awareness of foot care and appropriate shoes.

Shoes! How many pairs do you have? Do they really fit your feet? Stand on two pieces of white paper barefoot and have a friend draw around your feet. Then, cut those feet out and put them into or on the bottom of your shoes. Do they really fit? Some snug is okay, but pushing hard against areas can increase your risk of ingrown toe nails, callouses, sores and, possibly, infections. Wear comfortable shoes that support the natural arch of your feet. Do you wear those high heels? A maximum of 4 hours at a time are recommended, as they put a lot of strain on your feet. Wearing socks protects the feet, too.

How often do you really look at your feet? If you have diabetes, you should do a daily foot check, using a mirror, if needed, to see all sides, looking for sores, callouses, ingrown toenails, hot red spots, etc. Many people have neuropathy in their feet, either from diabetes or back issues, where they may not have much feeling in their feet. Daily foot exams are then extremely important. If you have healthy feet and don't have diabetes, it might be good to do a foot exam once a week or so.

What does good foot care look like? Wash your feet daily, pat dry and use fast absorbing moisturizers on the top and bottom of your feet before you climb into bed. Avoid moisturizing between the toes, as it may encourage bacteria growth. Nail trimming is important, generally not rounding the nail, as it increases risk of ingrown toenails. Some people can't reach or can't see their feet easily to do foot care, so seeing a podiatrist might be an option. (Did you know that Medicare generally pays for nail and foot care?)

Exercise is important for your feet, too!!! Walking pushes blood to the toes, helping them stay healthy. I heard a podiatrist once say that if you can't walk, stand at the kitchen counter and move your feet up and down, stepping in place, to move the healthy blood to your feet.

When issues with the feet occur, see your primary care physician or podiatrist. Like most things, any issue caught early, can increase healing and decrease long term complications.

Don't shoot yourself in the foot by ignoring them!

Sometimes There is No Greater Joy

Why do people from all walks of life, who are sometimes exhausted from their day jobs, donate even more time and energy to their church? CONTENTS □ 1 sturdy comb □ 1 bath towel ☐ 1 wash cloth ☐ 6 band-aids (1/2" or 3/4") □ 1 bath-size bar of □ 1 small package soap facial tissues □ 1 plastic soap box 1 nail clipper holder 1 piece of strong □ 1 toothbrush ribbon or cord

ASSEMBLY

- Lay out the towel on a flat surface.
- Fold over about 5" on each long side.
- Place the rest of the items in the center under the folds.
- Roll up the towel.
- Use ribbon or cord to tie the towel together in the middle.

PLEASE NOTE

- Dark colored linens are recommended.
- We recommend leaving contents in the original packaging, but it is not required.
- No additions, deletions, or substitutions.
- Do not add money, photos, or personal notes.
- Do not include items with religious, camouflage, patriotic or military symbols.
- Pack only new or gently used items.
- · Do not include plastic bags.
- It costs an average of \$11 to ship each box of kits. Please consider a donation to your local OGT branch to help with shipping.

A new church has been planted in Kuna and Friendship Celebration Lutheran Church, Boise, is its mother congregation. Kuna Lutheran is currently meeting for worship in the local high school cafeteria with up to 60 people in attendance. The congregation wants to build their own sanctuary and other facilities from which to conduct growing congregational activities, but they are first in need of a parcel of land. The grant funds will assist in the purchase. The

mission of Kuna Lutheran is to celebrate God the Father's love for us in creating us and giving His Son; connecting in faith with Jesus, our Savior; connecting with others in love and care; and communicating God's love in the power of the Holy Spirit.
