We look forward to returning to two services when attendance increases.

A Note from Your Pastor

Dear friends in the Lord: When I celebrated my 15th anniversary at St. Paul, I shared with you 15 things that I have said through the years that are worth repeating. Now that I have had 5 more years here and we celebrated my 20th anniversary year here this summer, I have added 5 more items to the list. Here are 20 things to keep in mind (based on God's Word, not mine).

- 1.) God encourages us to be humble and to give all the glory to Him. If you succeed in your career, God has blessed you with your talents. If you succeed in school, who gave you the brain that you used? "And remember the Lord your God, for it is He who gives you the ability" (Deuteronomy 22:18).
- 2.) Be willing to take the initiative to seek reconciliation with others! God tells us, "As far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone" (Romans 12:18). Be a peacemaker, not a peace breaker!
- 3.) Be quick to forgive others. Be slow to be offended. After all, think of all that Jesus has forgiven you! "Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you!" (Ephesians 4:32).
- 4.) If the worship service in heaven is going to last forever, don't worry when we go over an hour in the service here on earth. We're just trying to get you ready for what's coming! "And they fell on their faces before the throne and worshipped God" (Revelation 7:11).
 - 5.) Jesus wants your life to be meaningful, and for your ultimate meaning to come from Him. "I have come that you may have life, and have it to the full!" (John 10:10).
 - 6.) Don't be overly concerned with how you, or others, look when you come to church. It's the inside that counts most. "Man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart" (1 Samuel 16:7).
 - 7.) Do come to church every week, except if you are ill. In worship God gives us His strength and forgiveness through Word and Sacrament. Stay connected to your power, the Lord. "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy" (Exodus 20:8). "Let us not give up going to worship, as some are in the habit of doing" (Hebrews 10:25a).
 - 8.) It's okay to laugh at church. It really is. Laughter reflects our joy for God's love and blessings. "Our mouths were filled with laughter, our tongues with songs of joy....The Lord has done great things for us, and we are filled with joy" (Psalm 126:2a,3).
 - 9.) Invite others to come to church with you. We invite friends to sporting events, movies, meals out, etc., so why not to the most important event of all—the Lamb's high feast. You may make an eternal difference in someone's life. "I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord'" (Psalm 122:1).
- 10.) Share your faith with others. Tell what Jesus has done for you. Talk of God's role in your life. There is no greater subject to share with someone than the love of Jesus. "For we cannot help but speak about what we have seen and heard [of Jesus]" (Acts 4:20).
- 11.) As you go through life, picture Jesus right there beside you—because He is. Envision Him in your home, in your car, in your office, at the football game, at the store. He is with you always, in all places. "I will never leave you nor forsake you....for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go" (Judges 1:5b,9a).

- 12.) Always be ready for God to change your plans. Life will not always go your way, but it will always go His way! "Many are the plans in a person's heart, but it is the Lord's purpose that prevails" (Proverbs 19:21).
- 13.) God gave us one mouth (which is open far too often), and two ears (which are not open nearly often enough). Let us all be far more willing to listen! "Take note of this: everyone should be quick to listen [and] slow to speak" (James 1:19).
- 14.) We are all on the same team. The enemy is the devil—not your fellow member, pastor or church leader with whom you may disagree. "For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms" (Ephesians 6:12).
- 15.) Remember that I thank God for each and every one of you. "I thank my God for you every time I think of you" (Philippians 1:3).
- 16.) Remember that I am always praying for you. "In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy, because of your partnership in the Gospel" (Philippians 1:4-5a).
- 17.) Remember that I care about you and wish you God's peace and power in all you go through. "It is right for me to feel this way about all of you, because I have you in my heart" (Philippians 1:7a).
- 18.) I like to remind people who say, "God will not give you more than you can handle" that this world will ALWAYS give you more than you can handle, which is why Paul proclaimed, "I can do all things through <u>Christ</u> who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13). On our own, we can handle NOTHING, but through Jesus, we can handle ALL things.
- 19.) What is the shortest verse in the New Testament? I mean in the original, the <u>Greek New Testament</u>. The winner is: "*Rejoice always*! (1 Thessalonians 5:16)" The long and the SHORT of it is, we ought to rejoice a whole lot more, as we think about how greatly we have been blessed by our Lord.
- 20.) These are my 20 points for my first 20 years here. What does the future hold? None of us knows, but we all know The One who holds our future, and each of us, in His hands, with love. "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future"

Suicide Prevention Week. By Lindsay Roach

As a person who has come up with plans to commit suicide, imagine my surprise when I was asked to write an article for the church Epistle about National Suicide Prevention Week, September 10-16, 2023. Naturally though, I figuratively jumped at the chance to

write an article for National Suicide Prevention Week. Did you know that NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) actually promotes SPAM in September? No, not the "meat," and not the junk email you hate to see, SPAM for us means: Suicide Prevention Awareness Month! We hold this special emphasis in September, as suicidal thoughts and actions are more common than many people realize.

So what are resources for someone who is going through a rough day? Whether you have a diagnosed mental health condition or not, anyone is welcome to call the WARM line: 844-775-WARM (9276). What is the WARM Line? Erik Gustafson, who is the NAMI Program Director, says it "is a telephone line staffed by individuals with lived experience who provide nonjudgmental, non-directive support to an individual [who is] experiencing [a] crisis." I myself have used the WARM line, and it was very helpful, before things ended up getting to what felt like a full-blown crisis, but when I thought a crisis was looming.

There is also a local resource if one is feeling suicidal, which is to call 988. When you call this number, it is not police dispatch. It will be a social worker or therapist who answers and who offers help!

Erik (NAMI Program Director) also pointed me to nami.org, where I found a document pertaining to the warning signs of a suicide. This is very useful for everyone to look at, for anyone can be or become suicidal, so you want to know the warning signs. You can find the document at this website:

Be concerned when someone makes comments such as "I wish I wasn't here" or "Nothing matters," as these comments are clues being given about how a person is feeling. Other warning signs are increased alcohol and/or drug use, aggressive behavior, withdrawal/isolation, dramatic mood swings, and impulsive or reckless behavior.

We all go through hard times, so we do not want to be judgmental of a person who may feel suicidal. In the past, the church could be very judgmental of a person who committed, or attempted to commit, suicide, and also of their family. This is not what <u>our</u> church body teaches! (Want to know more? Ask Pastor.) Please pray for those who are considering taking their own life and also pray for their families. "God will never forget the needy; the hope of the afflicted will never perish" (Psalm 9:18).





Our next book is "The Only Free Road: An Underground Railroad Saga Unveiled" by Particia Kimle and Kevin Kimle. Shirley Tice will host the group at the Northcrest Fireside Room. (Call Shirley or the office if you need directions.) (The Kimles are Ames residents and attend Memorial Lutheran Church.)

Barnes and Noble says: "February 1859. Two years and two months before the Battle of Fort Sumter that would mark the beginning of the Civil War, the first battles of this most perilous period in the country's history were already being fought along the middle American frontier. Eight months before abolitionist John Brown attempted to initiate an armed slave revolt in southern states by taking over a United States arsenal at Harpers Ferry in what has been called the dress rehearsal for the Civil War. Abolitionists, fugitives, bounty hunters, border ruffians, federal marshals and others battled for their ideas of freedom and justice along its paths. This stunning novel brings to life the surprising violence of ideas and actions of the Underground Railroad and puts you alongside major figures of 1859 America such as John Brown, Abraham Lincoln, J.B. Grinnell, James Jordan, as well as everyday people who shaped American history.
