

"WE ARE TO BE GENEROUS AND READY TO SHARE"

"They are to do good, to be rich in good works, to be generous and ready to share" (1 Timothy6:18).

Of all the gifts God gives, money is usually the one we struggle with the most. Unfortunately, many of us allow money to become the center of our lives and the pursuit of more money becomes the greatest passion in life. What we choose to do with our money and possessions reflects our sense of values and the depth of our faith and trust in God. For some of us, money represents power, security, and happiness. For some, the accumulation of money is an end in itself. Jesus warns us in Matthew 6:24, "You cannot serve God and Money." When God is our treasure, money not only provides for our needs but is used to extend God's Kingdom and to help those in need. Money, like all other things, is a gift from God. God Owns Our Money. "You shall remember the Lord your God, for it is He Who gives you the power to get wealth, that He may confirm His covenant that He swore to your fathers, as it is this day" (Deut.8:18).

God provides us with both our abilities and means of employment to enable us to earn the money we need to provide for our needs and to support God's mission. **We are to receive and use God's gifts with thanksgiving** (Philippians 4:6) and be cognizant of the fact that, as **God's stewards**, we are caretakers of His money, which is only on loan to us. With the help of the Holy Spirit, we acknowledge that all we own belongs to God, and we begin to understand our responsibility to be faithful in the management and use of what we have been given. As the servants were accountable to their Master in the Parable of the Talents (Matthew25:14-30), we are accountable to God for how we use our money. Through faith, we will use God's money in the way He directs us to use it. God may choose to give us extra money <u>not to raise our standards of living, but to raise our standards of giving.</u>

Generous and Ready to Share

It has been said we have been given two hands so we can receive with one and give with the other. It is nice to be on the receiving end, but it is even more meaningful to be the giver. Jesus said, **"It is more blessed to give than to receive"** (Acts 20:35). Giving should not be an onerous obligation, but an opportunity. Through our giving, God is able to make an impact in our world. He uses our generosity to build His Kingdom, to help those in need, and to strengthen and enrich us as givers. Giving is something that does not often come naturally, but God's grace virtually compels a response to His love (2 Corinthians 5:14). The depth of God's love within us makes us cheerful givers who view giving as an opportunity, not an obligation. God's grace empowers us to be **"generous and ready to share."**



"Beyond the Table" is the March National Nutrition Month theme.

As a retired member of the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics, the theme makes me wonder what it is all about?

At the table, I love to talk about wonderful, tasty foods that nourish our bodies. I like to address the way a plate should look, with half of the plate vegetables, a quarter of the plate protein rich food (poultry, fish, lean meat, beans), and a quarter of the plate a starchy food (whole grain, potato, etc.), with use of healthy fats (olive oil, canola oil, nuts, avocado, etc.). In addition, a glass of low/ non-fat milk, and fruit on the side or for a snack. I love all the colors that can show up the table! God made such wonderful looking, tasty healthy foods to keep our body strong and able to do our daily tasks! I love the conversation and love that appear at the table as we share the bounty! What praise!

Yet, the logo is "Beyond the Table." So, what is beyond the table?

My first thought is the planning that it takes to make the meal. What are the menus for this week? What do I need to purchase at the store to supplement what I have in my pantry/freezer? Do I have all the food groups covered? Am I spending my money wisely at the store? How can I do better? Making a list is important for me, but sticking to it is harder, don't you agree?

Preparing the food is also "Beyond the Table." Consider preparing food in a safe manner (proper temperatures, clean utensils & working surfaces), cooking with low fat or healthy fat methods, making foods tasty with herbs and spices, using colors to enhance our enjoyment of the meal.

March makes me think of spring! Flowers and gardens! Should I plant a garden or pot some vegetables for my patio this year? Yes!!! Bring some flowers to the table to make it more fun to sit down together to eat, not in front of the tv or with our devices.

"Beyond the Table" makes me think of foods that I eat that are not at the table, too. Those nibbles, snacks, whatever you call them...do they add to the benefit of my body? Of course, I love desserts and fun foods, too! There, portion size, enjoying every bite is important for me. I might do better sitting down at the table to eat those, not wandering around, or watching tv, where I really might not be tasting and fully enjoying that yummy food.

Beverages should also be "Beyond the Table." Water! Water makes up about 60% of our body weight! Keep it filled up!

In addition to healthy eating, "Beyond the Table" promotes being active, as you are able. Some people need to run, swim, others walk, others just march in place, do stretches and strengthening activities. Lots of choices. Our bodies are meant to move and the more I sit, the more I hurt. I need to make a plan to move almost every day, so that I can keep moving. So, what are you doing? Are you hurting when moving might make it better in the long run? Start small and find success in the little things to cumulatively create big successes!

Adequate, restful sleep, managing stress are also "Beyond the Table" thoughts to keep our bodies and minds healthy. Maybe do a self-check on those things, too.

So many parts of "Beyond the Table" to consider! I pray spring brings good weather, sunshine, flowers & lots of joy as we rejoice in the new life that Christ has given us in Him and Him in us.



Lutheran Braille Workers (LBW) has the opportunity to reach individuals with visual impairment who live in spiritual darkness with the hope and salvation of Jesus Christ. There are millions of people around the world who are blind or visually impaired. They seek to strengthen their Christian faith while coping with isolation and dealing with physical, mental, and spiritual struggles. They often find it difficult to access Scripture -based reading materials.

This grant will provide LBW the opportunity to produce and add to their library 50 to 100 Scripture-based topical materials in Braille and specialized large print to help meet the spiritual and emotional needs of people who are visually impaired. Because LBW works with every Christian denomination, these materials would be available for outreach and evangelism at no cost to those who are blind or visually impaired regardless of faith or belief.
