Being a Caregiver by Linda Goldsberry

Have you ever been a caregiver or needed caregiving? Let's look at all ways of receiving or being a caregiver.

Caregiving encompasses the broad range of support provided to individuals who need assistance with daily living activities due to age, illness, disability, or other factors. This support can include physical care, emotional support, and help with tasks such as personal hygiene, household chores, transportation, and managing medications. Caregiving can be a demanding role, often impacting the caregiver's own physical and mental health.

Types of Caregiving:

- Family Caregiving: This involves unpaid care provided by family members or close friends.
- Professional Caregiving: This includes paid care provided by trained individuals, such as home health aides or certified nursing assistants.
- Independent Caregivers: Individuals who provide care independently, often without formal training or certification.
 - Respite Caregivers: Provide temporary care to give primary caregivers a break.

Activities involved in caregiving can include:

- Personal Care: Assisting with bathing, dressing, grooming, using the toilet, and other hygiene tasks.
 - Household Tasks: Grocery shopping, laundry, cleaning, and other household chores.
 - **Meal Preparation:** Preparing meals, feeding, and managing dietary restrictions.
- **Health Care:** Coordinating appointments, managing medications, and communicating with healthcare professionals.
 - Transportation: Providing rides to appointments, errands, and social activities.
 - **Emotional Support:** Providing companionship, listening, and offering reassurance.
 - Financial Management: Paying bills, managing finances, and handling paperwork.

Do you see yourself in some of these situations? I have seen myself doing some of these and did not even realize I was being a caregiver.

If you need help or like to help, I am sure there are members of our church that do some of these things

Have you felt alone in your grief? Do you feel as though people have forgotten your loved one? One of the most satisfying aspects of meeting with other participants is the shared feelings you have with each other. Are you free to talk about your loved one, or not? You realize that others are going through similar pain. It is refreshing to feel free to talk about your loss, how much you miss your loved one and what he/she provided in your relationship. You will learn from each other; different coping mechanisms, what not to do, and how to helps others.

The program includes three weekly components: weekly video seminars, facilitated group discussion, and home workbook personal study exercises to reinforce the weekly session topics. Preregistration is required to participate in the GriefShare program, for the purposes of providing adequate supplies and seating arrangements.

We welcome all adults who have experienced a death of a spouse, child, family member or dear friend. Don't go through your grief without the support of loving, Christian friendships. Journey from mourning to JOY. Peace and Pain can coexist. Our group will be meeting on **Mondays**, **from 1 pm to 3pm**, beginning on **August 25**, **2025** and continuing until November 17, 2025. 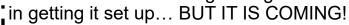
IT'S REUNION TIME

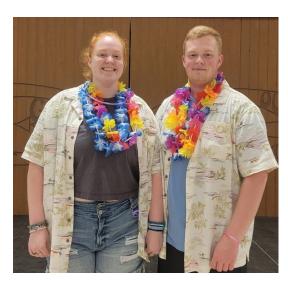

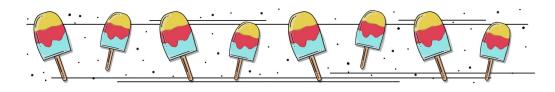

2023-2025 LWML MISSION GRANT #24 —**\$100,000**God's Word for Central and South American Missions

Lutheran evangelism efforts are being intensified in countries like the Dominican Republic, Chile, and Uruguay. The need for Spanish language Bibles, Luther's Small Catechism, children's materials, devotions, and other resources is continuous. New pastors who are being trained to be missionaries and evangelists need to be equipped with materials that help share the Good News.

This grant will provide for the translation and printing costs of approximately 25,000 books by Lutheran Heritage Foundation (LHF). LHF will distribute the printed books free of charge to people in Central and South America who live from week to week and have little to no savings. Even though economic or political conditions may force missionaries to come and go in these countries, they leave behind the Lutheran books which continue to teach for generations



Over 435 million people in our world speak Spanish, and many of those men, women and children are still waiting to be introduced to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. One good example: These students of St. Paul Lutheran Church in Uruguay are 80 percent unchurched. LCMS missionary Rev. James Sharp has been thrilled to provide free copies of the Spanish-language A Child's Garden of Bible Stories, which they can take home to share with their siblings and parents.

Our next book for Sept. 11 at 7:00 pm is *Chateau of Secrets* by Melanie Dobson. Goodreads says: A courageous young noblewoman risks her life to hide French resistance fighters; seventy years later, her granddaughter visits the family's abandoned chateau and uncovers shocking secrets from the past. Gisèle Duchant guards a secret that could cost her life. Tunnels snake through the hill under her family's medieval chateau in Normandy. Now, with Hitler's army bearing down, her brother and several friends are hiding in the tunnels, resisting the German occupation of France.

But when German soldiers take over the family's château, Gisèle is forced to host them as well—while harboring the resistance fighters right below their feet. Taking in a Jewish friend's baby, she convinces the Nazis that it is her child, ultimately risking everything for the future of the child. When the German officers begin to suspect her deception, an unlikely hero rescues both her and the child.

A present day story weaves through the past one as Chloe Sauver, Gisèle's granddaughter, arrives in Normandy. After calling off her engagement with a political candidate, Chloe pays a visit to the chateau to escape publicity and work with a documentary filmmaker, Riley, who has uncovered a fascinating story about Jews serving in Hitler's army. Riley wants to research Chloe's family history and the lives that were saved in the tunnels under their house in Normandy. Chloe is floored—her family isn't Jewish, for one thing, and she doesn't know anything about tunnels or the history of the house. But as she begins to explore the dark and winding passageways beneath the chateau, nothing can prepare her for the shock of what she and Riley discover...
